A native Washingtonian, 45-year-old Stanton Ganders was born September 28, 1912, near Bickleton. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel F. Ganders, who came to Southeastern Washington in 1883, Stanton was reared by devout parents, and continues to apply basic religious principles in his everyday life. He is a member of the Presbyterian Church.

From Bickleton public schools, he went to the University of Washington and was graduated in 1934 with a B.A. in political science. He then majored in law at the University of Michigan.

In World War II, Stanton Ganders served three years and nine months, mostly overseas, and personally received six battle stars while a member of the Eighth Air Force, 467th Bomber Group.

LIFETIME DEMOCRAT

Stanton Ganders helped reorganize and revitalize the Democratic Party in his district; was one of the founders of the Fourth Congressional District Democratic Council, 1946; and was chairman of the Klickitat County Democratic Central Committee, 1940-41.

President Truman appointed him to represent his region in Washington, D.C., at the National Safety Conference in 1952.

An active member of the Grange, the Farm Bureau, and the Northwest Conservation League, Stanton Ganders is also a member of the Masonic Orders, IOOF, and Elks Lodge.

His avid interest in foreign affairs prompted a personal inspection trip of 10 European countries in 1954, at his own expense. He came away confirmed in his belief that the United Nations is "our best hope for lasting peace."

NINE YEARS IN SENATE

From 1948 to 1957, he served as a State Senator, representing Benton, Franklin, Klickitat, and Skamania counties.

Stanton's friends say one of his greatest achievements occurred in 1954 when he won the lovely, gracious, and talented Miss Betty Fraunfelder, now Mrs. Stanton Ganders. They met at a Shrine Club meeting in Bingen, Wash., and renewed their acquaintance at a Governor's Conference in Seattle. They have one child, Larry, 22 months old.

A gifted soprano and chromatic accordionist, Swiss-born Mrs. Ganders and the Fraunfelder family have brought to millions the fine traditions, love and enthusiasm of the Swiss people through their performance on stage, screen, radio and TV.

The Swiss Government wrote: "We have been informed of the wonderful work you have been doing in hospitals throughout the United States with your concerts and lectures on the International Red Cross. Your efforts in the interest of international understanding, world friendship and world peace have been greatly appreciated."

A Few Highlights from State Sen. Ganders' Legislative Record:

- Urged Federal Agencies to take more active role in helping farmers with finances.
- Substantially raised State aid to school districts.
- Opposed scheme to "siphon" Pacific Northwest power to California. Petitioned Congress and President Truman on this vital matter.
- Sponsored Act allowing Richland to incorporate.
- Mainspring in development of Lewis and Clark highway.
- Sponsored legislation placing ceiling on amusement tax.
- Fought to secure special division in office of Superintendent of Public Instruction for handicapped children.
- Aided many measures strengthening Public Utility Districts.
- Favored law setting maximum work hours for females at 8-hour day.
- Promoted various sanitary and safety acts beneficial to labor.
- Mended legislative stalemate: in state emergency, helped organize Senate with opposing party, achieved working coalition. Result: Became Chairman of powerful Senate Roads and Bridges Committee, to greater benefit of Southeastern Washington. "He put partisan politics below principle, and put power behind \$67 million highway bond issue."
- Champion of \$66,763,625 highway bond issue. Restored Washington state highways to place among nation's best. (\$6,500,000 for new Pasco-Kennewick highway bridge. Responsible for thousands of miles of new roads in Southeastern Washington and improved primary and secondary highways: \$49,250,000 for U.S. 99; \$4,250,000 for four-lane Snoqualmie Pass; \$5,000,000 farm-to-market roads in Columbia Basin; \$1,703,625 for Agate Pass Bridge bonds.)
- Sponsored successful act authorizing issuance of bonds for construction of a new state office building, new state library building, parking facilities.
- Supported The Dalles Dam, McNary and John Day Dams, and other Columbia River projects.
- A leading proponent for Agriculture Enabling Act of 1955, allowing farmers the opportunity to help themselves.
- Strengthened Savings & Loan laws in Washington. Placed on more equal operating basis with those chartered by Federal government.
- Sought establishment of a pilot plant for experimental research on gasification of Washington coal, to help develop state's natural resources.
- Voted for cash bonus to State's veterans of World War II, and Korean vets.
- Aided passage of Controlled Access Highway Act.
- Furthered state aid to agricultural fairs.
- Supported State Council for Children and Youth.
- Defender of Indians and Indian fishing rights.
- Urged President Truman and CAB to act promptly, thus providing air service between Tri-City and Seattle.
- Singlehandedly obtained legislation enabling counties, in absence of a commercial dealer, to sell crushed rock to farmers and others.
- Responsible for establishing several new state parks, and revenue measures to maintain these attractions.
- As Chairman of Medicine and Dentistry Committee, aided passage of bills important to practice of medicine and licensing of medical personnel.
- Advanced several bills concerning Industrial Insurance and Social Security.
- Promoted measures improving standards of hospitals and rest homes.
